Los Angeles Trip

Course Description

This course explores the historical and contemporary Hollywood film and television business through on-the-ground learning in Los Angeles. During the study in LA program, students will visit film studios, libraries and archives, museums, and other historical sites to explore the history of the Hollywood studio system using a variety of research methods. Students will also research film and TV work, examine breaking trade coverage, and meet with industry professionals to analyze current issues and trends shaping the media landscape.

Student Learning Goals

- 1) To develop an understanding of historical and contemporary Hollywood business cultures, institutional dynamics, and industry trends using a variety of historical, critical, and methodological approaches.
- 2) To gain professionalization opportunities and forge pathways towards successful creative careers in the media industries.
- 3) To analyze Los Angeles as a media capital and industry hub through hands-on, experiential learning via site visits, field trips, and guest industry speakers.

- All readings are available on Canvas under the weekly schedule. Reading formats include PDFs and links. There is no assigned textbook for this course.
- Screenings are available for free via Kanopy and via streaming platforms. We have provided a range of screening options for most assignments, in the hope that students can use platforms they already have access to.
